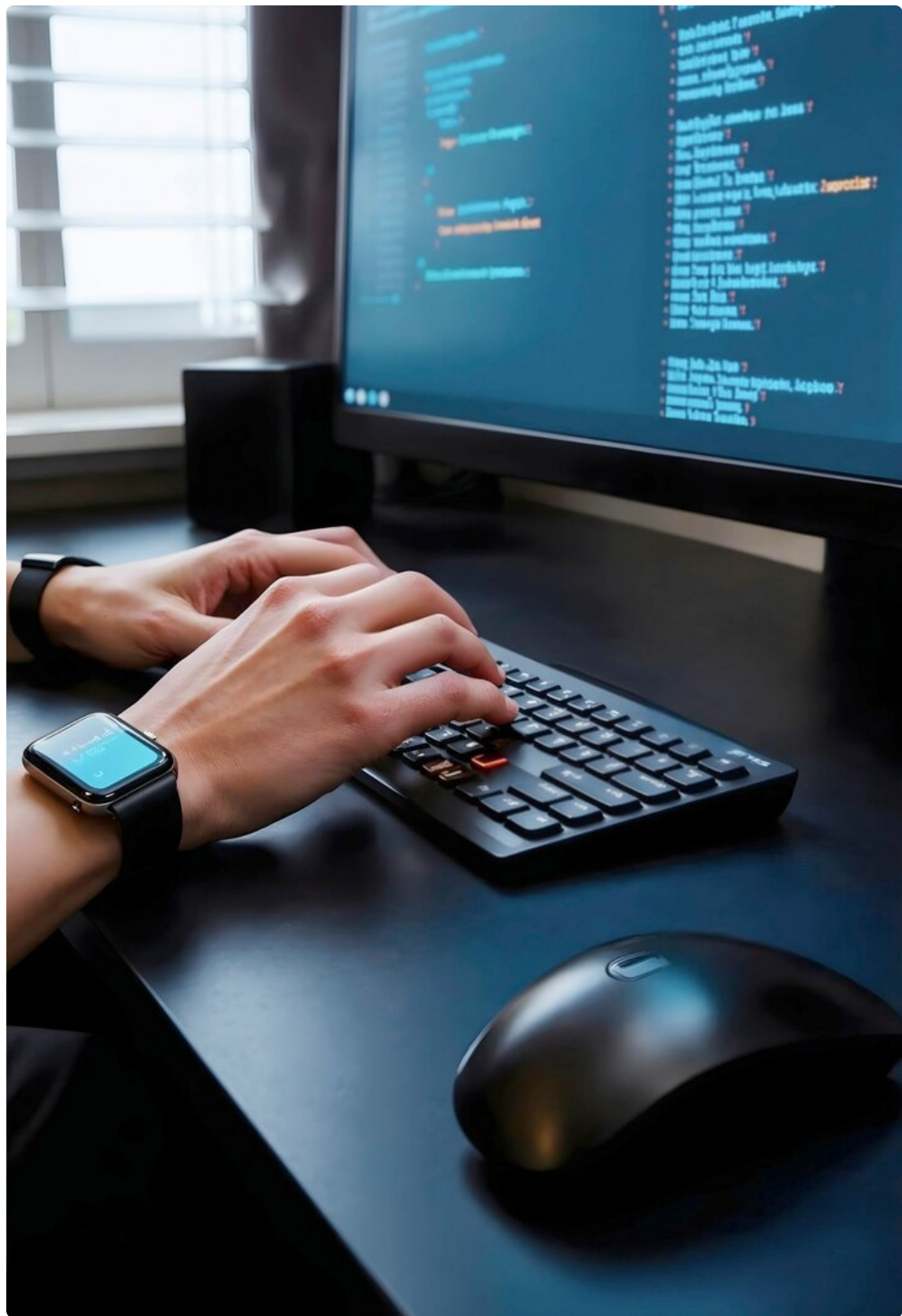
Leading Attractions in Rochester
