

Commack does not always make the first draft of a Long Island itinerary. Travelers planning a Suffolk County visit often aim straight for the North Fork vineyards, the Hamptons, or the larger downtown strips in Huntington and Port Jefferson. That is precisely why Commack can be such a rewarding stop.
